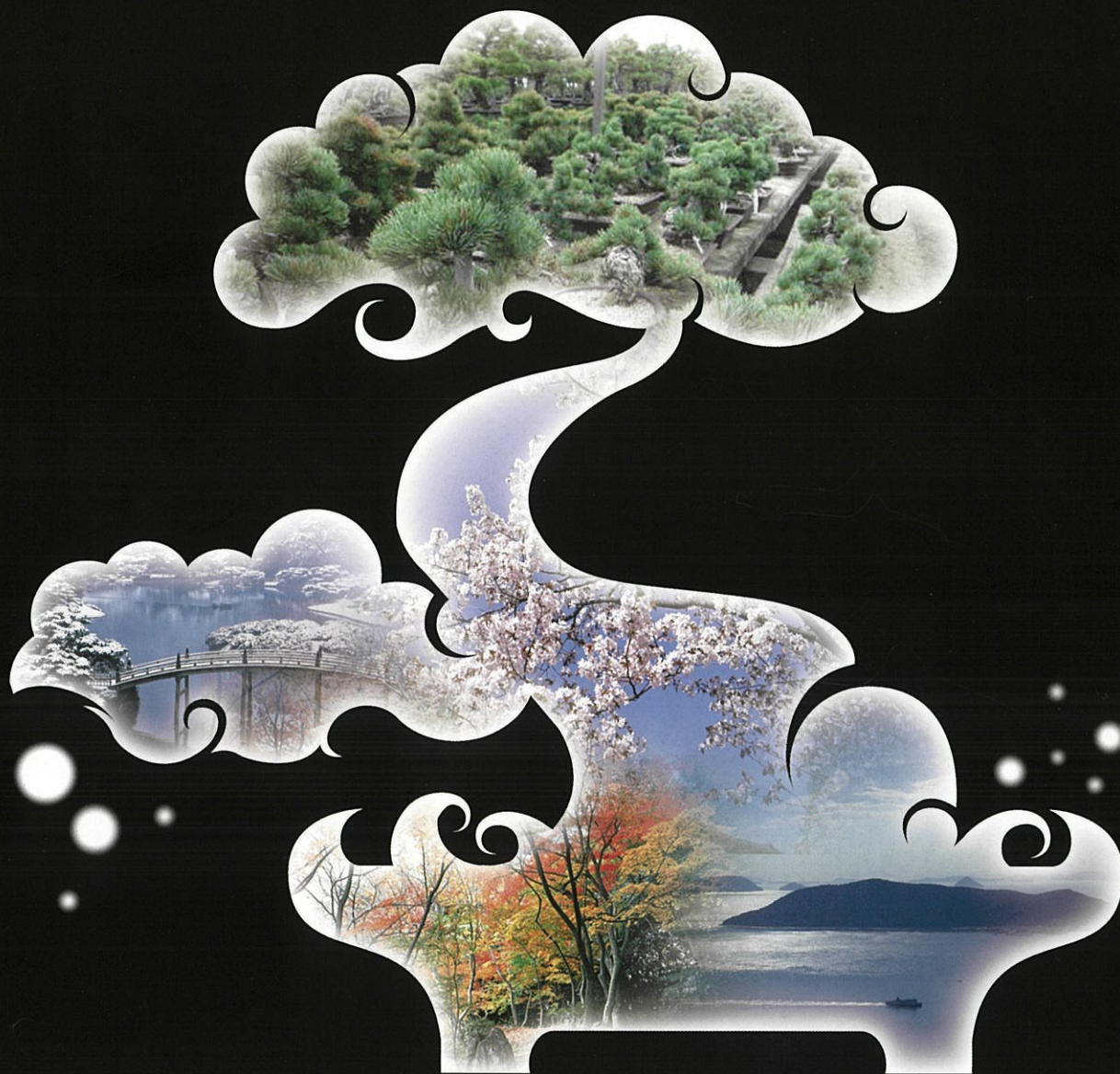

About Kagawa Prefecture

Shikoku is Japan's fourth largest island, southwest of Japan's main island Honshu, and is divided into four prefectures: Kagawa, Tokushima, Ehime and Kochi. Situated in the northeast part of Shikoku, Kagawa is Japan's smallest prefecture and is connected to Honshu by the Seto Ohashi Bridge which crosses the Seto Inland Sea to the north. Kagawa is blessed with rich nature and a gentle climate which is warm throughout the seasons, with little rain and long periods of sunshine. Attracted by the ideal climate and advantageous geographical location, the Japanese government and private sectors set up many of their branches and offices in the capital of the prefecture, Takamatsu city, making the city a hub of Shikoku.

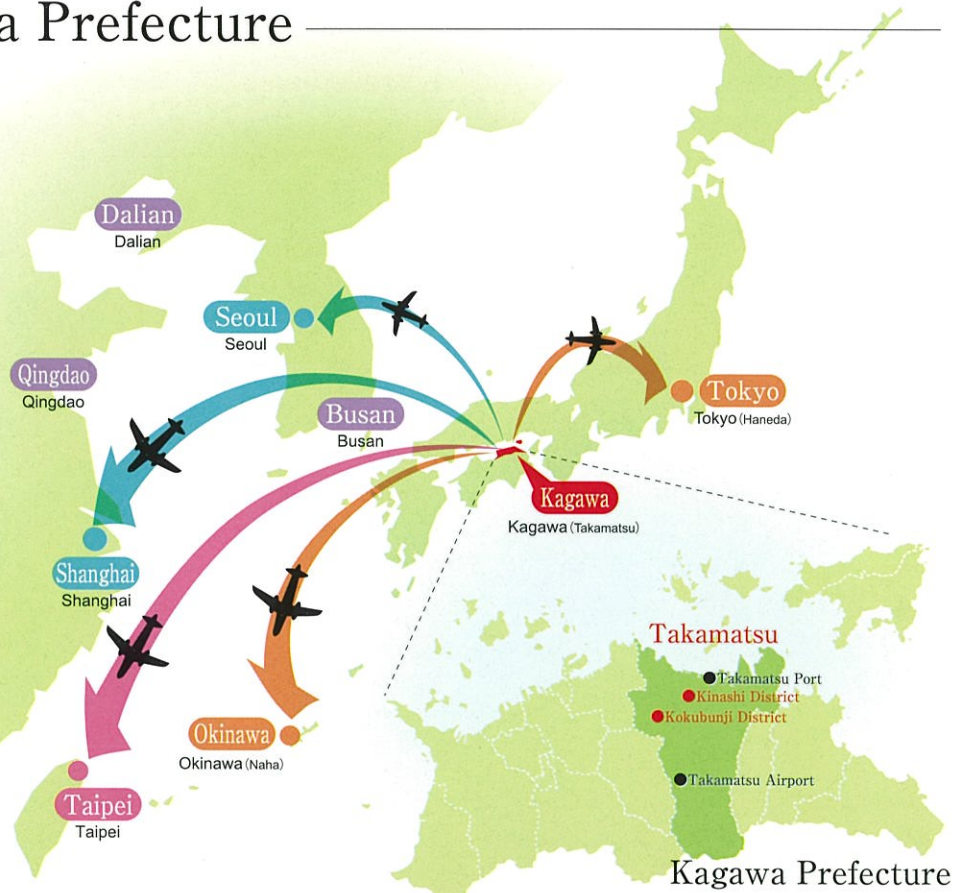

Points of Interest in Kagawa



Ritsurin Garden

Ritsurin Garden is the largest of the gardens designated in Japan as a Special Place of Scenic Beauty. The landscape includes 6 ponds and 13 miniature hills, carefully arranged to harmonize with the dark green pine forests of Mt. Shiun in the background. The park's beauty has been praised around the world, and recently received the highest rating of three stars by the Michelin Travel Guide.



Islands of Seto Inland Sea

Beautiful islands of varied sizes appear to float atop Japan's largest inland sea, the Seto Inland Sea. The second largest island, Shodoshima, which has a year-round warm climate perfect for growing olives, and Naoshima, which is well known around the world as a sanctum of modern art, draw many tourists.



Kotohira-gu Shrine (Konpira-San)

The guardian deity of the sea, historically called "Sanuki Konpira-san," is enshrined at Kotohira-gu. The famous stone steps leading up to the shrine consist of 785 steps to the main hall, and a total of 1,368 steps to the inner hall. Souvenir shops and udon shops are set up on both sides of the stairs. There are many sightseeing locations near the shrine, including the oldest remaining kabuki theater in Japan, the Konpira Grand Theatre (Kanamaru-za) and Takadoro, the tallest stone lantern in Japan.



Sanuki Udon Noodles

Udon has a long history of popularity in Kagawa, due to the ready availability of the fine ingredients including high quality flour, salt, small dried sardines and soy sauce. Udon bearing the traditional name of Kagawa, "Sanuki," is famous throughout Japan. It is said that there are as many as 800 udon restaurants in the prefecture, and many tourists from all across Japan come to visit Kagawa just to get a taste of Sanuki udon.

Kagawa Bonsai

Kagawa Prefecture is Japan's largest producer of pine bonsai, with 80% of the total domestic market share. In addition to the beautiful tree forms, pines grown in the well-drained sandy fertile soil of Kagawa are popular for their hardy build and resistance to root rot. Their popularity is not only limited to Japan, and as exports to foreign countries increase, these Kagawa Bonsai are gaining popularity around the world.



History of Kagawa Bonsai

Kagawa prefecture has a long history of producing bonsai trees, said to have begun 200 years ago during the Edo period when wild trees in the mountains and along the coast were potted and sold. The mild climate by the Seto Inland Sea, with little temperature variation throughout the year, long sunshine duration and little rainfall, along with the pruning and grafting techniques acquired through seedling production of fruit trees and mulberry bushes make Kagawa a perfect location for raising bonsai. The main bonsai production centers are in the Kinashi and Kokubunji districts in the western part of Takamatsu. While black pines (*Pinus thunbergii*) is the most commonly produced variety, Japanese white pines (*Pinus parviflora*) and cork-bark black pines (*Pinus thunbergii* var. *corticos*) are also produced.

Promoting the Expansion of Bonsai Exports

In cooperation with various organizations, JETRO Kagawa has been providing active support for the development of overseas distribution channels for bonsai produced in Kagawa Prefecture.



JETRO Bonsai Export Conference

Since 2010, JETRO Kagawa has continuously invited prominent bonsai dealers to Japan to attend its business conferences, offering them opportunities to discuss business with bonsai growers in Takamatsu city's Kinashi and Kokubunji districts. So far, buyers from major EU countries including Germany, France and Italy have visited bonsai nurseries to discuss business, resulting in direct exports from Kagawa bonsai growers to overseas destinations. Now that buyers can purchase bonsai directly from growers, there is the added benefit of reduced distribution expenses.

Activities of Local Bonsai Growers

In order to expand exports around the world, the Takamatsu Bonsai Export Organization was established in 2013 by bonsai farmers from the Kinashi and Kokubunji districts participating as principal members, together with JETRO Kagawa, the Kagawa prefectural government, and the Takamatsu municipal government. Representing small bonsai growers, the organization performs bulk exports of goods with the aim of enabling bonsai enthusiasts and buyers from abroad to purchase high-quality bonsai at reasonable prices. As part of facilitating exchange with overseas bonsai enthusiasts, bonsai growers go abroad upon request and promote the spread of Japanese culture around the world. Their activities include giving demonstrations, conducting workshops, providing after-sale maintenance services, and collaborating in joint presentations of bonsai and Japanese cuisine or traditional crafts. In addition, some nurseries accept trainees. New approaches, such as growing bonsai on a contract basis or selling bonsai by subscription, have also been introduced.

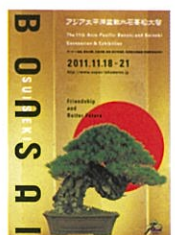
Takamatsu Bonsai Convention 2014

The Takamatsu Bonsai Convention 2014 was held for a period of six days from Wednesday, October 29 to Monday, November 3, 2014, with Tamamo Park as the main venue. Organized by the Kagawa Bonsai Production Promotion Conference, the convention attracted bonsai enthusiasts from all around the world, including Canada, the Philippines, Vietnam, South Africa, and Reunion Island. The events included meetings attended by national representatives, exhibitions, bonsai demonstrations and workshops, and bonsai nursery tours.

The 11th Asia-Pacific Bonsai and Suiseki Convention and Exhibition in Takamatsu (ASPAC)

The ASPAC was held in Japan for the first time for a period of four days from Friday, November 18 to Monday, November 21, 2011, with Sunport Takamatsu serving as the main venue.

First held in Bali, Indonesia in 1991, the prestigious convention marked its 11th convention that year. Featuring a harmonious display of bonsai trees and suiseki stones, it was attended by bonsai and suiseki enthusiasts from more than forty countries, including Australia, the U.S., and European and Asian countries.
