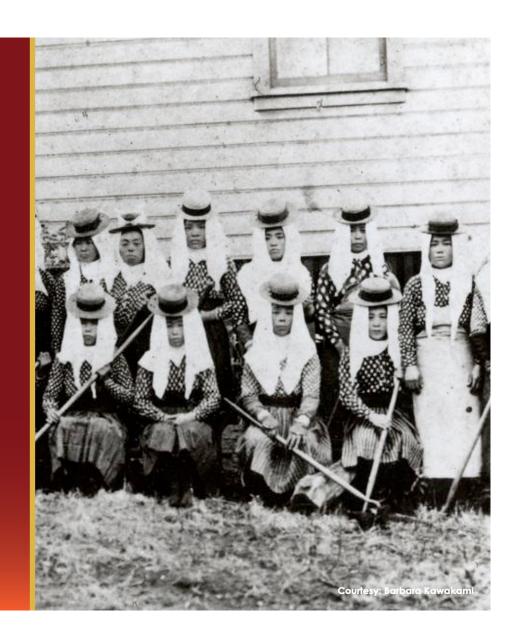

29,907 Japanese nationals live in Hawai'i



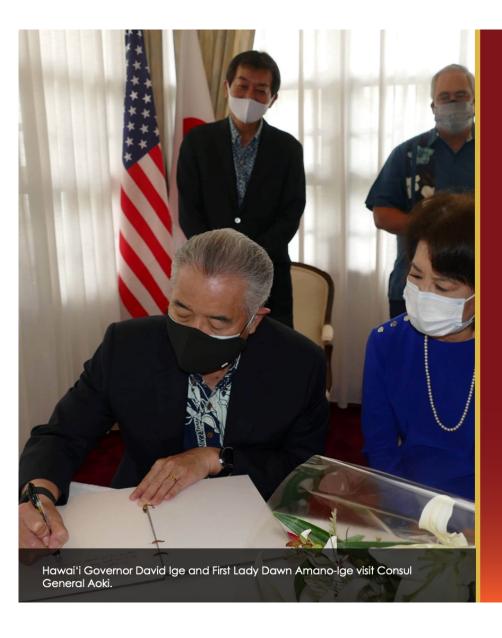
13% of Hawaii's residents are of Japanese ancestry

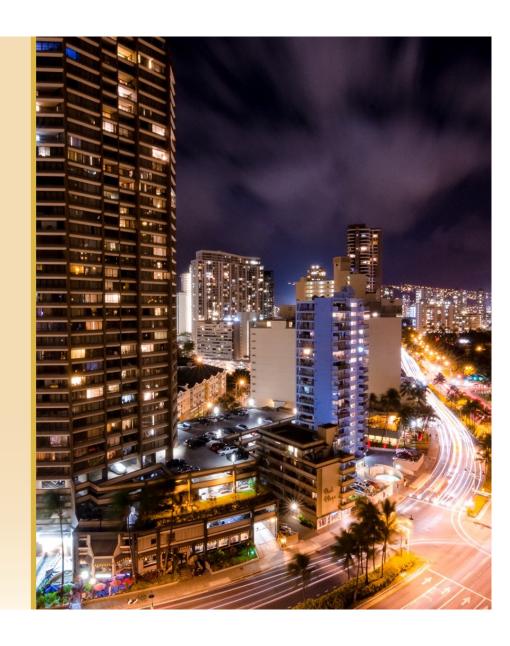

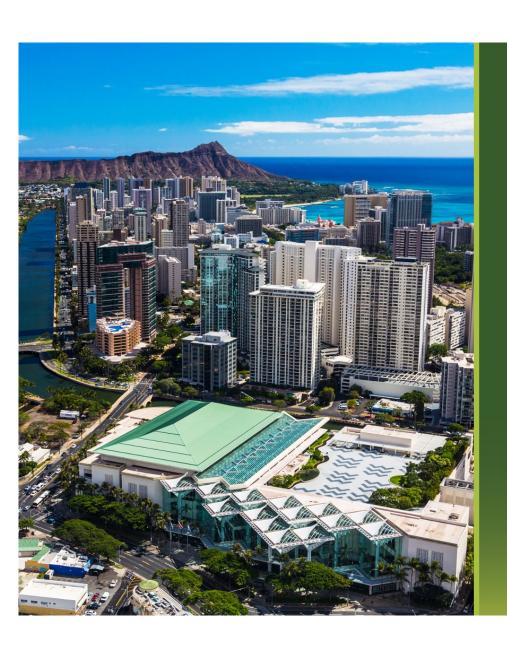

Tax Climate in Hawai'i

- No personal property tax
- Credit against tax paid on purchase of capital goods, such as machinery and other equipment
- No state tax on goods manufactured for sale out of state
- No stock transfer tax
- No unincorporated business tax
- Research and development state tax credit for qualified research

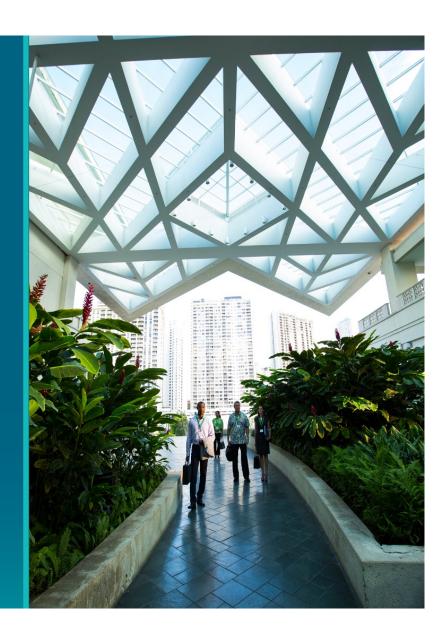
