Colon Doll (Republic of Cote d'Ivoire)

Under the influence of Western culture, the people of Cote d'Ivoire began to dress differently during the French colonial period. These dolls are based on the native people's jobs and clothing around that time.



Natural Masala Chai (Republic of Kenya)

Black tea cultivation began in Kenya under English colonial rule. This chai is made from an exquisite blend of six spices, including ginger, cinnamon, and cardamom.
